

What was under the tree? Hopefully a membership in RAC. That is good value for money spent. While reading other club bulletins I note a unanimous voice in calling for all Amateurs in Canada to join RAC. And yet the numbers do not grow with any degree of significance. I'm not sure exactly what the figures are but the silent majority are riding the coat tails of the vocal minority. That doesn't seem fair. The federal government instituted a program called "User Pay" with respect to services made available to all Canadians by Crown services. The result was that those programs that failed to get serious funding by users participation and funding were dropped or severely reduced. For our purposes RAC is also "User Pay" with the exception that all programs and services are funded from a single point of entry: membership dues. Where the government can reduce or eliminate some programs and still run the country, RAC itself would be eliminated if funding from a majority of Amateurs failed to materialize. We all know how our health system has been hit by financial cutbacks. Imagine having no health system at all! Instead of everyone contributing their fair share to make the system work, we would be faced with significantly increased personal costs to keep ourselves in the game. Apply this to Amateur Radio. If RAC were to reduce services that were important to the survival of Amateur Radio in Canada because it could not meet its financial load, then we the individual Amateur would have to foot the bill. If the majority cannot find the money to support RAC, where are they going to get the money to support Amateur Radio by themselves?

There was one correction to the November minutes. Ben Price talked to the president of the Edinburgh Amateur Radio Club on 70 cm, not 70 m. It was moved by Greg Danylchenko (VE3YTZ) and seconded by George Roach (VE3BNO) that the amended minutes of the November meeting be accepted as amended and the motion was carried.

The annual club questionnaire was handed out soliciting members' ideas for club activities.

Three nominations have been received by the executive for the Joe Norton Award. The executive will make a decision this month and make the presentation to the winner at the January GM.

The treasurer, Janice Neelands, (VA3PAX) reported that the club was slightly behind on the budget but she was expecting extra income to come in to balance things out.

Rick Furniss (VE3IHI) reminded the club about the upcoming Canadian Ski Marathon, Feb. 7 and 8, 2004. Anyone wanting to volunteer should contact Richard Hagemeyer (VE3UNW) at ve3unw@rac.ca. This year the event will be run west to east. "Morning" and "afternoon" shifts are available. As well, they are looking for extra net controllers for Sunday.

The club has been awarded the RAC callsign VA3RAC for the Canada Winter Contest on December 27. Club members will be operating from various sites using this call sign.

There is still some hope that the ATV repeater can be sold. CJOH itself may purchase it allowing it to continue operating at its present location. If this sale falls through, the equipment, especially, the antenna support structure will have to be removed. Quotes for a crane to do so are being solicited.

The Groundwave editor Cary Honeywell (VE3EV) will be resigning at the end of May. Therefore, the club is looking for someone to take on this task. Cary will still be available to contribute articles as well as provide support for the new editor. The editor is also automatically a member of the executive. This position is a good way to get experience is publishing a newsletter as well as learning about all the activities of the OARC.

Ben Price reminded the members of the planned trip to the Dayton Hamfest in May. If you are interested let Ben know. Expected cost will be about \$500. Ben is also looking for people to man the promotional booth at shopping centres this winter.

Well wasn't that a party...

Not one of the office things that goes on this time of year, not even an ARRL QSO party. This was another of the 160m CW contests that a bunch of us participates in every winter as part of the VE2OJ group, or Outaouais Contest Operators Association. The "top band" has its special



group of aficionados, much the same way that 6M, the "magic band" has. For at least a few weekends a year we, ('2OJ collectively) are among them. I have mentioned the group and its trips to cottage country in rural Quebec in other years. It is a bit like a DXpedition but with great eats and a hamshack in the country squire class replacing the "roughing it on the beach" and generator drone parts.

This years' attempt had the best of everything; perfect weather for work on the antennas before the 'test, more and better toys and gadgets to get that last bit of signal out of the noise, good propagation and the usual easy going nature of a crew that knows what has to be done and gets things going like clockwork.

This year we had a few little snags, like an antenna tuner failure before the first dit was sent, and a main rig failure with a hectic ten hours left in the contest. Nothing like the threat of disaster to focus the mind. Nobody panics, even when their top of the line, multi kilobuck, fully loaded contest rig seizes up in the middle of the night. That's the kind of team we have. Every year we pick up a few tips and tricks along with the equipment improvements. This year, we had more and better antennas, better receivers and made better use of the internet to pick up a few critical contacts. Next time we will have even more antennas, perhaps better ones. The things that broke last time will be stronger, and the memory keyer that forgets how to send CQ will be retired in favour of one that will can handle the pace. We might get better at packing and unpacking all those bits of hardware that have to shuttle up and down the highway for these weekends. Now if only that connection between the ears and the fingers would get better, we'd be ready to take on the world.

The only other operating of any significance in the past month at VE3FFK was at the Rally of the Tall Pines, near Bancroft. This event is a lot like

the Canadian Ski Marathon, but with the skis replaced by cars that are too big, being driven VERY fast over closed roads. The safety implications are as large, and the terrain and remoteness guarantees that cellular phones become paperweights. The net operation is decidedly "casual" by CSM standards, but everything that needs to get through does so. The rally operates on several frequencies, both simplex and repeater style, making antenna and rig performance critical. With about 70 operators running for about 20 hours over three days, the whole operation hovers on the verge of radio chaos, but always manages to stay just this side of the line. You just might want to add it to your calendar for November 2004.

Now all I have to do is get ready for the Canada Winter Contest, and Straight Key Night, and maybe another transmitter hunt.

DC To Green Light How To Make A Magazine

As I pointed out in an earlier chapter, TCA started out as little more than a small periodical supporting the work of CARF. It was a way for the Federation to advertise what it was doing for Amateur Radio. The copy was gleaned from just about every available source of information on Amateur Radio in Canada and, believe me, there wasn't much of that. The driving force for obtaining copy was Doug Burrill, (VE3CDC sk) and as a journalist of sorts he was able to find many items of interest that would escape most of us. Of course this would lead to the publication of some obviously biased information but it was a good read nonetheless. The compiled version was then sent to Gil Stevens, the editor, who would tone things down and remove much that would get us all in trouble. Next it was sent to Steve Campbell, a non-Ham, near Picton Ontario, who then printed and published the issue. Since Steve wasn't totally familiar with the language spoken by most Amateurs, the occasional slip-up would occur and an article was published that made no sense. In the beginning that was a problem but as time passed Steve became more familiar with the lingo and when in doubt would call Steve or Doug for clarification. After the first few issues this problem all but disappeared. ... until later on that is.

The first few years of TCA saw the magazine evolve from a newspaper print bulletin to a flashy fine-paper magazine. A good part of the reason for this was that mailing the copy was expensive. The lighter the item the less it cost to mail. Various weights of paper were tried until we found the right combo. The cover could be harder copy with a shiny coat while the inside was still newspaper print quality. Even the number of pages was an issue. The most we could have was 66 pages. Adding one more page cost considerably more than we were prepared to pay. Or could afford for that

matter. Colour was out of the question. A colour copy was much heavier than black and white. Too many pictures or graphics could cause the weight to go up as well. Staying at 66 pages or less kept us out of the trouble and expense.

We did have advertising that help offset some costs. Heathkit was one of our first clients. Harold McFarland and Dollard Electronics in Vancouver were also on our pages. At some point in its development, Don Slater, VE3BID, became our advertising rep. Don worked advertising for CBC and this became his retirement project, a job he did very well. CARF had gone to individual memberships just after the start if TCA which gave it a mechanism for distributing each issue. For business reasons TCA was put under an "arms-length" company called CARF Publications which was set up to manage all publications produced by the federation. I believe it is still that way now.

Filling spaces in a magazine is not a simple task. Nobody writes exactly the number of words to fill a column of print. They also have a way of making sentences say absolutely nothing intelligent despite the tone of the article. This makes the job of being editor a lot of fun, if you can call pulling your hair out fun. Oxford, Webster and a Thesaurus become your best friends at times as can a bottle of painkillers and tranquilizers. While re-writing a submitted article can be one way out of the problem it is also time consuming and can be seen as an insult to the author. Amazing how many writers consider themselves a Hemmingway with articles for publishing in National Geographic, when they are really rank beginners who need a lot of help. It has a lot to do with ego. Everyone likes to see their name in print, unless you are found with a lady of the night, or they like to see their works published, unless they are writing briefs for the finance minister. As a editor you always want to spell the author's name correctly and get their approval for changes to their material. Cover it properly and everyone is happy. Nobody likes to be corrected but when it is pointed out to them that there is a better way of saying what they want to say they will usually bow to the experience of the editor. It also saves being sued for liable.

You also have to worry about timing. With club bulletins you can usually expect that whatever you print will be on time for events listed. A magazine is different. TCA had a three month lead time. Writers needed to be aware of the time lag between the submission of an article and its appearance on the subscribers desk. Publishing a magazine takes lots of time, planning and skill. It isn't a place where "Last-Minute Charlie" can work his muscle. An editor will often leave a few spaces blank until the last minute so that important and time sensitive items can make it in, but your article on how to melt snow from your tri-bander isn't going to be one of them.

If there are spaces left over just before publishing starts, editors will use whatever fill they have on hand to complete the page. The easiest one, which I use in this bulletin, is the motivational phrase. You can say something in a single line that is both motivational and space filling. Just increase the font size to suit. Another is the small advertisement block. You convince an advertiser to buy several small quarter-column spaces and then fill the blanks with money makers. As long as the advertiser is happy, so is the editor. There are many more tricks and if you look at various magazines you can pick them out.

Once the copy is finalized it will then be sent to the publisher to cutand-past into the final product. A good publisher can be a life saver. A bad one can be murder!


